From the Tastor's desk ...

As we continue through this Lenten journey and get nearer to the cross, I must admit this has been a Lent filled with a little more darkness than normal. As most of you know, we lost Roy's oldest brother last week, and I've found myself full of many different emotions.

The first thing I felt is grief and regret. *Why* didn't we go visit more often? How will things be now



that he is gone? At the funeral, we did get to gather with many family members we haven't seen in a long time, but I regret that we don't get together more. Knowing that we're all getting up there in years, we need to take advantage of the time we do have. I'm worried about my sister-in-law and what it's going to be like for her to go through life without the man she's been married to for 53 years. And I'm sad for Roy losing another brother.

Second...and this may sound really terrible...but now is just not a good time. On the day that Ralph died, we had just returned from Baltimore where we were helping to take care of our granddaughters. We had a wedding in Austin the next weekend and I needed to be in the office to prepare for upcoming things. I had things to do! But that's the way grief works, isn't it? We never feel like it's the right time. I wonder if Jesus' followers felt like this was a good time for his shift in ministry. Jesus, can't you wait just a little bit longer before we head into Jerusalem? You know what's going to happen and we need more time to prepare. Many of us feel that way during Lent: I just don't have time to slow down and reflect. I can't be bothered with thinking about this. There is just too much going on in my life.

Third, I felt a genuine joy for the life that Ralph had. He knew his Creator; he lived a life of dedication to his family, to his friends, to his church and most importantly to his God. Ralph spent every morning reading his Bible, which is so impressive to me. He had so much going on in his life but he didn't let that get in the way of his relationship with his God. It's a tremendous comfort when you know someone has lived a full complete life. I sometimes wonder if the disciples were able to find joy and comfort in the last days with Jesus. Were they able to see the impact His life had on them and others? Would they be able to rejoice in the life that He lived?

Lent brings forth so many different emotions and opportunities for us. I pray that you find your own way to relate your life to that of Christ, that you find ways to remember what Jesus did for each of us, and that you find

time this Lent experiencing your own journey as we journey with Christ to the Cross.






St. Austin is also asking those in attendance to bring a pie to share with the group in honor of the "Peace through Pie" concept.





Book: Genesis: The Story We Haven't Heard by Paul Borgman

Our Late Risers Sunday School Class just finished studying Paul Borgman's Genesis: The Story We Haven't Heard (2001). While I would say that we all are theologians with different levels of experience and training, Borgman is not a professional theologian, in contrast to many of the authors whom we read when dealing with scripture. He is an English professor and his book and our experience are the better for it. In the tradition of Robert Alter and his narrative art of literature approach to religious texts, Borgman takes us on eye-opening, arcing journey through Genesis, stopping occasionally to dally among the details, but focusing on repetitive elements and themes throughout the book so that it seems more coherent and applicable to contemporary life. Genesis becomes our story, not just their story.

Borgman criticizes our usual approach to "story" within scripture, noting that we traditionally take ten verses and attempt to glean larger life lessons from such clipped passages. Beware of that approach, he says, as we should be listening for more than that. We should hear scripture as it was intended to be heard, as a story, as literature, as repetition, as an echo, as something that is so important that the tiniest detail and the largest theme impact our lives at the same point.

He takes the Patriarchs to task with a refreshing honesty, stripping away our veneer of religious hero worship with a refreshing honesty about their failures, their successes, and their own journeys toward becoming the men and women that God desires them to be. We visit the failure of Adam and Eve, the dysfunction of their family, the boasting of Lamech, the pride of Babel, the righteousness of Noah, God's testing of Abram/Abraham, the ineffectiveness of Isaac, the vexing hesitancies of Jacob/Israel, and the vainglorious Joseph's maturation. Further, while we often focus on the males of Genesis, Borgman offers interesting, contemporary insight into the roles of Eve, Sarai/Sarah, Hagar, Rebekah, Rachel, Leah, Dinah, and Tamar. Borgman finds enough praise (and blame) for both genders and, while you may or may not take issue with his treatment of gender issues, he at least raises issues worth discussing in a usually sympathetic manner.

In the end, Borgman finds universal themes running throughout each Genesis story, themes worth considering for our own lives. He finds first that God desires for each of us to be a blessing for all nations, not just our own. In so desiring, God waits for us to join Him in His work and to learn His ways. God's demonstrated patience allows for our errors, but nudges us toward a reorientation from our usual destructive selfcenteredness toward recognizing, understanding, and acting on the needs of others. In so doing, Borgman says, God's will for us to be a blessing to all nations will be accomplished.

Genesis is in no way standard Biblical commentary. It may challenge the manner in which you believe that the Bible should be read and it may challenge your time-tested understanding of the beginnings of our faith. And it certainly will provide you with some encouragement to see Genesis' characters as real people with real problems. In the end, though, I found it to be a thoroughly reassuring message about the persistence of God's love for us and patience with us and an uplifting declaration about our collective capacity to join God in His work, to care about our fellow man, and to reclaim our own dignity and self-worth as His children.

back parking lot. We try not to use Styrofoam here in the building, but we do recycle yours at City of Austin's Reuse and Recycle Center on Todd Lane. Thank you to Alana Mallard (and Jack the Recycling Dog) and LaNell Coltharp for helping with deliveries.

The Programs of Micah 6:

1. Food Pantry (Thurs evenings & Sat mornings): We're participating in several new initiatives. The Hunger-Free Texas Project provides us with 2 teams of A&M students. One will create a strategy to better serve young adults, including UT students. The other will work to increase our supply of fresh fruits & vegetables. The Healthy Pantry Initiative will encourage shoppers to make healthy food choices and may include



cooking demonstrations. We've started new food rescue programs with HEB Riverside and with an Asian market.

2. Street Youth Drop-In Shelter (Sun afternoons) - We continue to see about 20 individuals a week. The winter garden was harvested and most of the produce went to the pantry. It's been replanted for spring. We've opened as an overnight shelter for five freeze-nights in 2019.

3. Home-Cooked Fridays (Fri late afternoons)– We're serving 140 guests each week, restaurant-style rather than food line style, with a made-from-scratch meal. We're always in need of donated table linens, florists' vases, & any silverware.

4. Women's Support Group (An Update) – The Women's Resource Group is a Micah 6 program that serves women who are currently homeless or have previously lived on the streets of Austin. We have been meeting for over four years, on Tuesdays from 11:00 – 1:00, at University United Methodist. There, we create a time and safe, loving place to share our stories and to support each other as we move through our lives. We also provide a meal, weekly bus passes and a shop in the Fig Leaf clothing store. Originally, our group was under the umbrella of M6 Street Youth Ministries and we served young women under the age of 30. We have, however, recently expanded to serve women of all ages. We welcome any woman in Austin who is currently on the streets or has been impacted by homelessness.

We currently have specific needs and always welcome new volunteers! These opportunities require little time and you will be supported by our current mentors:

- Additional mentors
- An MSW who could supervise students in the UT School of Social Work
- Cooks available on the Tuesday of your choice to prepare 8-10 servings of a meal including entrée/sides/dessert


Richard Robertson, facilitator of the Lifetime Learning Memoirs class, shared this appreciative remembrance:

High on my admiration list is Highland Park Baptist Church. I am not a Baptist--just a pre-natal Presbyterian. But over the last 55 years I have seen up close this wonderful church and their outreach to the community.

When our son, Rick, became eligible to join the Boy Scouts, we opted for Troop 410 at Highland Park Baptist. The scoutmaster was Jim Perdue a member of our church, Westminster Presbyterian. And Rick had gone to school with many of the boys in the troop. Troop 410 was a very active troop and strongly encouraged support from the fathers.

As an Eagle Scout I had a strong interest in supporting the troop and became the Merit Badge Counselor for all of the Citizenship Merit Badges. Also many of us dads went on all of the troop canoe trips down the Colorado and San Marcos/ Guadalupe rivers. We were all very proud when Rick became an Eagle Scout. Younger Son John also joined Troop 410 when old enough. He was active in the troop until cancer struck while in the senior year of high school.

John Miller, a pillar of the church, and I became friends during Rick's scouting days. His son Mike was also in the troop. John and I shared the canoe on all of the canoe trips and we both went with the scouts on some of their "overnights". Our paths continued to cross at Highland Park when I joined the Austin Genealogy Society. The church generously provided the site for the monthly meetings when I joined in 1998 and continues to this day. John was president that year.

Juanita Dodgen who was a member of the Society and had taught a couple of my Life Time Learning Genealogy Classes, told us: "You can learn about your ancestors' dates of birth, marriages, and deaths, but what you really would like to know is their stories. Everyone of you should be writing your stories." I quoted that to John and he joined our Memoirs Class. He actively participated in it until his untimely death.

The memoirs class met at Westminster Manor either in Bell Hall or in the Chapel. Before long John volunteered to be the T.A. (Teacher Assistant) of the Class and served faithfully for the next 12 years. In 2009 Westminster Manor began its building expansion program and the class had to find a new home. John

found us one at Highland Park Baptist. In fact we are still meeting in John Miller's Sunday School Class room.

The church has provided a site not only for our class but for years has provided class rooms for as many as ten Lifetime Learning Classes a semester. Over the years I have taken other classes there.
