FROM THE MINISTRY COUNCIL CHAIR:

The Ministry Council met on June 10th for a workshop to examine our direction for the year and we continue to make plans and goals for the remainder of the year. While we have had many successes in combining worship, missions, play and outreach, the council remains concerned about members that are not being reached or served effectively. This affects all ministries and we have made an effort to involve all eight ministries in planning events for all ages. It is our goal to meet people where their spiritual needs are. We have filled out the remainder of the summer and the early fall schedule with gatherings that include all or most of our ministries and we hope will give everyone a reason to invite someone to come and share. *(See the next page for an events calendar)*

The Council had a follow-up meeting on July 20th and received reports regarding Personnel, Finance, the organ restoration, and the Parsonage remodeling project. It was mentioned that there was not enough information getting back to the congregation about the activity of the Ministry Council. It was recommended that some information from the Council, as a whole or by individual ministry, be provided weekly or bi-weekly in one of the emails and that the Ministry Council minutes be added to the website after each meeting. It was also suggested that a link to the Alliance of Baptists website be placed on our website.

'Welcome Back Sunday' was refined and the mission project will be back-toschool supplies for Popham Elementary in Del Valle ISD. There will be a church-wide breakfast at 9:30 a.m. and Sunday School will begin for all ages at 10:00 a.m. with many in our children and youth departments promoting to new classes. Children and youth who are moving to a new class will be acknowledged during worship. Touch groups, the Council and deacons are reaching out to Touch Group Members to ask that they be in attendance on that Sunday.

The Council received wonderfully complete and exciting reports from Rev. Cheryl Kimble and Rev. Kevin Mitchell summarizing all of the summer activities.

Organ donations to the restoration projects have been coming in. We do not have totals at this time. On the other hand, we have dipped into our reserves to keep the church running while summer giving to the general fund has run \$10,000 behind budget. Can you help us turn the corner now?

We are returning to our earlier schedule of meeting after Worship on the third Sunday of the every month. Everyone is welcome to join us and hear our ideas and give us your thoughts.

On August 26 at the Quarterly Church Conference, we will be choosing our Nominating Committee. Please be thinking of your candidate for that committee and inquire if they would like to serve before the church conference.





ORGAN PROJECT STATUS UPDATE


On Wednesday, August 5, 2015, those in attendance at the Called Church Conference voted unanimously to move forward with restoring our pipe organ. The vote was followed by applause and joy, as members expressed excitement and support for rebuilding such an important part of our music program and a valuable part of our history.


A contract with C. Bobsin Organs has been signed and work will take place in August and September. It will take some time for parts to be ordered and work to be completed, but according to the builder, the organ will only be out of commission two or three weeks during the process. By Advent, we will have a fully functioning, reliable, valuable pipe organ!

This project will substitute the previous organ project of replacing the pipe organ with a digital organ, which was voted into place at the August 10, 2014 Called Church Conference. With the expert consultation of Father Larry Covington, renowned organist and consultant, it was discovered that we can replace the insides of the console and make other suggested cleaning and repairs to bring our existing organ up to or better than its original state.

Money in Highland Park's current Organ Fund will be put toward the first phase of the restoration, which is 80% of the entire project. We will continue to raise the last 20% of required funds (approx. \$14,000.00) over the next few months. Thank you to all who have donated to this project. Phase 2 will begin after the 1st of the year and will include re-scaling the principals and revoicing the organ, both of which will enrich the sound of the organ.


A note about "A Study on Prayer" from Rev. Kimble:



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Summer Spotlight: From our Associate Pastor, Rev. Kevin Mitchell

At Youth Camp this summer our own Rev. Cheryl Kimble was our Camp Pastor with the theme, "Your One Wild and Precious Life." Our crew, while not as big as we've been in the past, hung out together more than any group I've been with since my first SWBYC in 1998. Our conversations were real and deep as was our laughter. Thanks to Andrew and Emma we brought back the foosball trophy, continuing HP's dynasty. Cheryl did a terrific job in worship. She put together a great team of worship leaders who gave us some of the most meaningful camp worship experiences I can remember. No senior pastor gives more of themselves to their kids than ours. None.

Children's Camp was also a great week of camp. We took 13, the most we've taken since y'all called the Mitchells here. Our adult team was incredible—Annie Cranford, Kyle Nelson and Wesley Russell. They all used humor to correct rowdiness. The kids were often unaware that their behavior had been curbed until afterwards, if even then. Their grace and love was beautiful to watch and receive. Rev. Larry Bethune from UBC was our Camp Pastor. He encouraged us to "get in the game" with regard to church and our faith. Our crew got it. They are bright, funny and I can't wait for our next adventure together. What a bright, fun future we have.

Vacation Bible School was another full week—48 campers, 32 volunteers, 4 days of energy, a lifetime of friendships and faith. First, THANKS to everyone who's fingerprints were on our week. Our theme HEROES gave us a look at our faith's ancient heroes, our everyday heroes, and the ways we can be heroes too, by living the Fruits of the Spirit. Ask any of the kids who spent the week with us to name the Fruits of the Spirit and they will tell you, or I'll buy you a Dr Pepper. You can be proud of how our church loved those kids at VBS and taught them. Thanks also for inviting your friends! We have six kids, three families, seriously interested in getting to know our faith family. How great would it be to see more fruit from this adventure.

Mission Trip 2015 took us to San Francisco to serve the under resourced, to give away God's love with our own hands, to worship in two wildly different churches and out in the haunting beauty of the Bay Area. We stayed downtown in a hostel two blocks from the soup kitchen where we served breakfast at 6:45 a.m. every morning but Thursday. Living in the neighborhood, called the Tenderloin by locals, let us begin to feel more like neighbors with the people we came to serve. That small shift in thinking and feeling has been profound and we didn't leave what we learned there in the Tenderloin. That impression is with us still. Working at Glide's free breakfast ministry, at Habitat for Humanity's Re-Store, at the biggest darn Food Bank I've ever been in and all over town, our crew, working 13 hours two of our days there, gave their whole heart to our work for Love's sake. Highland Park, please ask our kids to tell you a story or two about this adventure. Or come on Wednesday, Sept. 23 as we share more stories and pictures. We are still unpacking what God gave us there and plenty of what we brought back is for you too. Thanks again for letting us do church this way.
