
### GIVE A BOOK and TAKE A BOOK (or two!)

HPBC plans to lead several mission trips to hurricane-affected areas this year. **Our first will be a weekend trip to Port Aransas, TX "Port A" from February 23-25.** In addition to the winds and torrential rains that Hurricane Harvey brought, a storm surge came across the ship channel, flooding the island where Port A is established. This small coastal town needs our help.

This is a multi-generational mission trip, and friends and family are certainly welcome to come along with our HPBC team. We are partnering with First Baptist Church in Port A on this trip to help clean and repair buildings on their site. Most of the work will be debris clean-up, caulking and painting.

Each missioner will pay \$100 which covers a shared motel room (room has two queen beds) for two nights with complimentary breakfast and a few shared meals. Please bring spending money for up to three meals. Scholarships are available. On Friday, February 23, there will be an early afternoon departure and an after-work departure from the church, but missioners are certainly welcome to take their own vehicle. The estimated travel time is 4 hours one way. We expect to be back to Austin in late afternoon/early evening on Feb. 25.

Many leaders estimate it may take years for residences and businesses to rebuild. Some residents left the island and do not plan to return. Of the remaining residents, many are seniors and in great need of assistance. Some residents had insurance; others did not. Many residents are overwhelmed and reluctant to ask for help. Our coastal neighbors are in great need. Will you consider making this trip a priority?

### **ZNOITDELETER REFLECTIONS** in the Mirror

#### "Sleepless in Austin"

The other night, for no apparent reason, I couldn't sleep. I wasn't worried about anything or excited about something in the future. I just couldn't get to sleep.

I know better than to TRY to go to sleep. That never works. You have to let go to enter dreamland.

So I lay there wondering why I was wide awake. And then it occurred to me. Why don't I ask God? And so I did, and as usual, I got an immediate insight into an area of my life where I was seeking direction. Eventually, I fell asleep. Letting go and accepting my sleeplessness was the key.

This episode reminds me of the many times I have resisted my circumstances. Not only have I resisted sleeplessness, I've spent countless hours fretting because I was in a job I hated. I've

wasted even more hours worrying and being fearful for one reason or another. I wish I had been able to surrender and ask God to show me what I needed to learn.

I'm reminded of the story that Holocaust survivor Corrie Ten Boom tells about her captivity in a Nazi concentration camp. She and her sister decided to follow I Thessalonians 5:18 and give thanks for everything, including the horrible conditions they lived in. They even gave thanks for the fleas that infested their bedding and gnawed on their skin.

Eventually, they learned that giving thanks for fleas wasn't so outlandish after all. Having fleas in their bunkhouse meant the guards wouldn't set foot in their area. They were left alone! I've never faced anything as dire or life threatening as Corrie Ten Boom. But sometimes I have felt in as much peril emotionally.

In the devotional book "Jesus Calling," there is an exhortation from Christ to give up the illusion that I deserve a problem-free life. Part of me wants all difficulties resolved -- now. But in reality, as Jesus told his disciples, "In this world you will have trouble."

But still, I yearn for everything to be perfect, for all issues to be settled and for there to be peace and contentment all around.

Get over it, I tell myself. Grow up!

I'm still not going to be happy when I'm struggling with a problem or I can't sleep at night, but perhaps I will have the presence of mind to make peace with my problem or my sleeplessness and listen to what God has to say about it.

I recently learned that Kevin Mitchell and I share a love of the same hymn, "Be Thou My Vision." Words from the first verse seem appropriate in this message:

Be Thou my Vision, O Lord of my heart


Naught be all else to me, save that Thou art

### Dinner and a Movie! Monday, Feb 5 @ 6 pm


