







CHANGES DURING THE SCHOOL WEEK: SAFETY FIRST


Reverse flow of the parking lot: During the school week, the park-ONE WAY ing lot at Highland Park will operate in a clock-wise flow, opposite of the typical flow of our parking lot. This change is being made to keep students safe as they exit their cars during pick up and drop off. The angled spots at the back of the lot and north side of the lot will become back-in angled spots during the school week.

Procedure to enter building during school hours: To ensure safety of their students, Paragon Prep uses the Raptor software which performs a sex-offender check by scanning a driver's license. All visitors to the building will be required to undergo this scan before being able to walk the building during school hours, Monday -Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. During school hours, all visitors to the church building will need to enter at the main entrance on the north side of the building where the scanning machine is located.

PLEASE NOTE: These changes will only apply during the school week, and will not affect the flow of the parking lot or access to the building on Sundays.



Teachers will be setting up their classrooms in early August and the students arrive on August 12. Once the school year has begun and things settle in, Paragon will host a tour for the church on Sunday, September 8 so church members can walk through the spaces.




New Budget Approach

With our new lease with Paragon Prep, we have an opportunity to improve our budget process. We'll have two main sources of income - contributions and rent. One way to be effective stewards of these revenue sources is to align specific expenses with one source or the other.

We could dedicate rental income for property maintenance and planned renewal, administrative operations, and lease expenses. We have building repairs and replacements that are long overdue as well as building improvements needed to relocate our youth and enhance our outreach. These are not all wishlist projects, but delayed upkeep or a consequence of reallocating space to Paragon. The Finance Ministry is looking into the cost of a reserves study that would identify how much we should be saving to care long-term for our building.

With our contributions, we could pay for our ministers, staff, and congregational ministry programs like family life events, bible studies, children and youth programs, outreach, touch circles, hospitality events, environmental conservation, service projects, and worship. Continued and increased contributions from us would directly enable the programs and people that serve us and those we reach out to. At current levels, and with reliance on unpledged contributions and activity participation donations, we are fairly breakeven on personnel and programs.

Excess from either source could be used to fund our external missions giving (what we now call our missions budget), new outreach initiatives, pay off our debt, build contingency reserves, or other priority.

For the remainder of 2019, the Finance Ministry is proposing that we use our increased rental income to cover the cost of the tenant transition and consider needs above our existing budget as they arise. In November, we will prepare the new budget for 2020 with Ministry Council and staff input for approval by the congregation in December. Please consider the idea of two budgets – one for property & administration, and another for personnel & ministry. The hope is that with a new source for property & administration, our personal giving can be committed directly to personnel & ministry. We welcome your thoughts and suggestions now.


Sunday mornings offer many ways for you to serve the mission of this church.


