Some Words About and From the First Ministry Council

In our transition from *Board and Gavel* to *Council and Christ Candle*, we attempted to focus on discernment and worship in making decisions and doing our work.

Discernment requires us to cultivate sensitivity to the ways God works in our world. As we considered discernment we became more comfortable with being worshipful, whether we were discussing technology, missions, or money. Each of us grew into our called position.

Some valuable concepts we learned were delegation, communication, and consecration. There were times of frustration that members did not sign up to be part of a particular ministry, times of surprise when things worked so well, times of sadness and disappointment when our work became unpleasant, times of abundant joy when it was obvious that God's hand was guiding us, times of gratitude for expressions of love and support from the congregation.



Each of our meetings centered around a theme: Hope, Love, Think, Simplify, and Forgiveness are a few examples.

There were two meetings which particularly exemplified our desire to do *Worshipful Work*. One was our last meeting. It came so close to Christmas I was really in doubt of each one taking time to do what they had been asked to do. How could I have been such a doubter? Each person came with a quotation or scripture that was meaningful to them as a result of doing their work. I was profoundly blessed by the time and thought given to their choices. The other meeting which reflected each persons' dedication to his or her calling was the joint retreat of the 2011-2012 councils. We closed with the joint retreat with the Lessons From Geese below.

Lessons From Geese

Fact 1: As each goose flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the birds that follow. By flying in "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier, because they are traveling the thrust of one another. (See page 2)

Fact 2: When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help, and give our help in return.

Fact 3: When the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position.

Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership. As with geese, people are interdependent on each other's skills, capabilities and unique arrangements of gifts talents or resources.

Fact 4: The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those in front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement the production is greater. The position of encouragement (to stand by one's heart or core values and encourage the heart and core values of others) is the quality we seek.

Fact 5: When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help or protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then they launch out with another formation or catch up with the flock.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as geese, we will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.

With much gratitude to each of you who have practiced the Lessons listed above in your support of the 2011 ministry council and encouragement to do the same in 2012.
