Against a backdrop of grief, anxiety and stress, we're also heading into a new season that brings with it hope (and hopefully cooler temperatures). This fall I'm cautiously optimistic that we're going to have a chance to get back together in person. If Austin's numbers continue trending the way they are, the council will be looking at when it's safe to return to church. Our hope is ahead of the holidays but we'll have to see how things look.

Until then, let's continue to be The Church at Highland Park in the best way we can virtually. I think we're all doing a great job together. I know our staff and many across the church are going above and beyond to carry us through this unique time and I have confidence we're going to come back even stronger than before.

Here is this month's rundown:

- Church Business Meetings A quarterly Church Conference will be held on Wednesday, September 16 at 6 PM on Zoom. You are encouraged to attend if you can. We will select the 2020-2021 Nominating Committee and approve minutes from past meetings. Then, our next Church Council meeting will take place Sunday, September 27 at 9 AM on Zoom. Any and all members that would like to join us are welcome to do so.
- Important New Class from Cheryl & Masyn Our ministers are teaching a new weekly class called "What Now? A Faithful Christian Response to Racial Injustice." It's focused on having healthy conversations about the racial and social issues impacting our country. It will take place on Zoom each Wed at 7 PM through the end of this month.

- 3. Website Progress The team has been working hard to fill in the content of the website which is a big undertaking because our website is large. We should only be a few weeks away and we can't wait to show it to you.
- 4. **Paragon Prep** Paragon started virtual school on August 17 and it is going well. They are finding their usual fun and creative ways to stay connected as a school body and teach their students through this time. They are keeping an eye on the numbers of cases in our area to determine when they can safely open for in-person classes in a pod system.
- 5. Please Continue Supporting HP I want to thank each of you for continuing to give to the church through this challenging time we are hanging in financially in a much better way than many churches and it's a testament to each of you that we're able to continue to maintain all of our financial commitments through this challenging time. Virtual Sunday School continues on Sunday We are gathering Sunday September 6 at 11 a.m. instead of the usual 10 a.m. The plan is to wrap up the current unit ("Living out of or into Faith") and transition to a study of the Book of James. Later this fall and into the Advent season, the focus will be on the beginnings of each of the four New Testament Gospels in their probable historical order. The class will compare and contrast them, including the two with Christmas narratives, and consider other related issues.
- 7. Join Us for Church this Sunday I have really been enjoying seeing our musicallytalented members participate in our services recently. Our staff does a great job of helping us stay connected with our faith during this time and I want to again thank all who are pouring so much time and energy into them. Keep an eye out for an email on Sunday mornings with a link to that week's service.
- Virtual Classes for Youth and Young Couples Masyn Evans-Clements continues to lead an 11 AM Zoom Sunday School class for youth aged 6th-12th grades and David and Kim Balkum facilitate a group for young couples usually twice a month at 7 PM over Zoom. <u>Contact Masyn</u> if you're interested in joining either.

Please Let Us Know if You Have Emergency Needs We have some members who may be in a situation where they are low on supplies, food or other vital items and are not able to get access to those items. Virtual Christian Education



OUR MISSIONS IMPACT



Drive a Senior-West Austin ran an Emergency Food Pantry/Delivery program from March 23 to August 27 in response to the pandemic. They wanted to ensure that no senior in Austin went without access to healthy and safe food. It was an incredible adventure and they are very proud to have served the Austin community in this capacity. Over 200 seniors were served with 10,140 lbs of food including fresh meals and over 676 deliveries made, none of it possible without 128 incredible food pantry volunteers. A range of volunteers delivered food from the Drive a Senior food pantry during its five-month run, including Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity, National Charity League, Young Men's Service League, Junior League of Austin, and volunteers from Drive a Senior's supporting congregations. Drive a Senior received grants from HEB and City of Austin, which offset expenses for food and refrigeration.

These two agencies have functioned separately for over 30 years and feel now is a great time to bring the two together.

Now more than ever, senior transportation needs are rapidly growing, and as one large agency, they will be able to expand services to meet the needs of all of Austin's aging adults. Mary Ellen Sullivan and Brooke Ostrom currently serve on the board of Drive a Senior- West Austin.

If you are looking for low-contact volunteer opportunities, here it is! **Anyone is welcome to join**.

Drive a Senior West Austin has partnered with Hope Food Pantry and Micah 6 Food Pantry to be the transportation piece of their food distribution services. These 2 pantries are the first of many sites they hope to provide delivery services for so food can safely get from pantry to the doorsteps of seniors in need of food.

Deliveries start this month for both pantries on the first and third Tuesdays from 1:30-3:30.

HELP SENIORS GROCERY SHOP AND ORDER GROCERIES ONLINE!

While it is still unsafe for seniors to visit grocery stores, we are giving them the support necessary to safely shop and eat with dignity.

This program will allow us to pair one volunteer with one client to assist them with grocery needs doing one of the following:

- Shop on behalf of a senior and deliver their groceries to their front door
- Order groceries over the phone with the senior for curbside pick-up and delivery by the volunteer, or to be delivered straight to their home



 Assist with teaching seniors how to order groceries/goods online or over the phone. Many of our clients just need a little guidance to become self-sufficient in this new way of shopping

We will also include prescription pick-up in a Sidekicks responsibilities when needed




