
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



Those who feel comfortable are invited to come to the church on Sunday mornings to attend our outdoor service. You may find a designated parking spot and remain in your car or you may park and find a socially-distant square in front of the Teague Chapel. If you plan to get out of your car, please bring masks and chairs, although we have back-ups should you forget yours. There are two tables along the side of the seating area where you can pick up any worship elements for that morning, along with a drop off box for those who wish to turn in their offering in person.

How are you this week?

Have you heard? We hosted our first outdoor service at Highland Park Nov 1st and we're so excited to be gathering in person in a socially-distanced outdoor environment for as long as it's safe moving forward.

For those who don't feel comfortable coming back in person, please feel ZERO pressure to do so. We have invested in equipment that will allow us to give you a live-stream of outdoor services for in-home

viewing. This will be the first time we have ever live-streamed services outside and we're going to be learning some lessons. If for whatever reason the stream of the service has issues, we will be recording it and will send that out as a back-up option.

This is a new endeavor for all of us and I want to recognize the tireless work of the staff in researching, planning and executing this to set us up for success. They have invested so much time and energy in this and I'm just really proud of them, alongside the council. Thanks as well to all of you who stepped up to help with set-up, teardown and other "jobs" that help us succeed.

For those who will be joining us at the church in the coming weeks that want a few more details to help you prepare, Kelley set up a <u>really helpful page</u> on our website where you can learn more.

As we take this next step together I want to take a moment, on behalf of Highland Park's staff and Church Council, to thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your support of the church this year and patience as we have worked together to navigate this pandemic. We're not out of the woods yet by any means but we're adapting to it together. Our expectation is that we'll stay outside for some time until numbers come dramatically down, so please make sure you have some good cold weather clothes and hot chocolate/coffee available for future services.

Alongside in-person services, there are a lot of other important stuff happening and I wanted to make sure you have the rundown:

1. **Womanfest this weekend!** - This Saturday-only event will take place Nov 7th from 9-3 PM and will be available as a socially distant in-person experience or virtual option. We're so excited to have Meghan Becker, an Enneagram expert

leading the event. Thanks to Abby Byrd and her helpers for planning this great event for the women and friends of this church.

- 2. **Website Progress** The Highland Park team is working hard to fill in the content of our large site and hopes to launch the new site just in time for Advent!
- 3. **Paragon Prep** All grades are back with about 50% of their families choosing in-person learning. During the week, the back of the parking lot is blocked off so the school can be outside as much as possible. Paragon is polling families and likely to move from half days to 3/4 days next week.
- 4. Please Continue Supporting HP I want to thank each of you for continuing to give to the church through this challenging time we are hanging in financially in a much better way than many churches and it's a testament to each of you that we're able to continue to maintain all of our financial commitments through this challenging time. As a reminder, you can support our church by donating online via credit card or e-check here or mailing a check to the church or dropping your offering into one of the boxes we'll have on hand at outdoor services (no passing of the plates mid-pandemic).
- **5. Virtual Sunday School continues on Sunday -** We're shifting virtual Sunday School for adults to 9:00 AM to allow those who want to attend in-person the time to get to the church. The Zoom link will continue to be emailed out on Sunday mornings.
- **6. Virtual Sunday School for Youth continues on Sunday -** Masyn and the youth families have decided on Sundays at 6:00 PM for Youth Sunday School going forward.
- 7. Please Let Us Know if You Have Emergency Needs We have some members who may be in a situation where they are low on supplies, food or other vital items and are not able to get access to those items. If you are in this position, please contact the church and we'll do everything we can to help you get what you need.

Please let me know if you have any questions or ideas on ways we can best steward our congregation through this challenging period.

Youth Sunday School Class - 6:00 p.m. on Sundays over Zoom

FALL FOOD DRIVE THROUGH NOVEMBER 22



Activity on the Highland Park property has been increasing over the last few months, along with property repairs and upgrades. The choir room HVAC unit was replaced, a handicapable ramp was installed on the back building (formerly the Steve Matthews classroom) and a few odds and ends were repaired. Paragon replaced the awning for the little back patio and relocated the Gaga ball pit to make the playground and basketball area more usable for their current P.E. needs.

Along with the school's use and the addition of our outdoor church services on Sunday mornings, we are all using and caring for the building/property as best as possible during a strange and hard time.









The Church at Highland Park was an election polling place on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. Due to the record amount of early voting and mail-in ballots, Election Day was not very busy on our campus. The school made it a completely virtual day for their students and teachers so there would be no hassles in the parking lot.



Paragon is operating with approximately 50% of their enrollment in person and 50% virtual at home. All students and staff on campus wear masks, except when eating, and they operate in a pod system where grades are all kept separate. We have entered into a one school year lease agreement to adjust both the rooms used by the school and the rent collected. While a challenging and weird experience, Paragon is beyond grateful to have been at the Highland Park property during this time, as they would not have been able to spread out and separate as well at their old properties.
