

Looking back at the summer and forward to the future...



You hear all the time that churches are afraid of change. I guess that comes from the fact that for most churches, especially traditional Baptist churches, the process they go through for change takes a while. It might not be that they're afraid of change, it's just that change takes a while. Well whoever said that churches were afraid of change never met the Church @ Highland Park.

Since March 1st, 2020, Highland Park has been changing and morphing into this new and exciting place to be. It all started with our name change. That was something we had been talking about for a long time but at the beginning of 2020 the Council began to talk seriously and you all went along with basically no questions asked. Then the pandemic hit and we were forced to change the way we did a lot of things. The staff worked from home and the church went to online recorded ser-

vices and then the staff live streamed the service. Then we went outside to worship and finally we came inside and wore masks. Currently we are still wearing masks, worshiping in person and live streaming. The staff also worked on a new Web-site that launched in the midst of working from home and we changed our church year from Jan-December to June-May.

Over the last few months some new changes have been happening. Gary Nicholson, the brother of Kay Greenhaw, is an architect who goes into churches and evaluates them, looking for ways they could improve first impressions. After going through all his recommendations we've made many changes and even some that came out of our Council meetings. I thought I would share a few in case you haven't noticed.

We placed new flags at the entrance and up the drive to help visitors know where the entrance is. They say All are Welcome and All are Worthy.

We added a huge entrance sign that people could see the minute they turned into our park-

We hung a huge banner that you can see the moment you walk in the door. It says "Our Vision: To Follow Jesus Christ by Embracing All."

We've added new lighting in the atrium hoping to make it brighter. (Thanks Joe for your help with this)

We removed 5 back pews to make an area where families with young children can sit in family groups. This is to help with small children who are staying in the Sanctuary during Worship. This is to protect all from Covid.

We are working to help improve signage inside and around the building.

Putting together gift bags for visitors with a new church mug, a new flyer and a new bag with the church logo on it.

Some of the things we are still working on is refinishing and painting the side walls in the Sanctuary, trying to make the platform ADA accessible, and making sure everything in the building has our new name on it.

In the last few weeks we've hired Kathy Stanley as the Director of Operations and we've hired Chris Vineis as our new Music Director. We're still in search of a part-time evening custodian.

It's been a busy year and a half and so much is happening. Never let it be said that the Church @ Highland Park is afraid of change because we've been changing rapidly and it's all good! Share us with your

friends, come back to services (but wear a mask please) and

let's be the church God has called us to be!

The Church Council has decided that due to the rising number of Covid cases, Sunday School classes are going to be postponed until further notice and children will be staying with their families during worship instead of going back for extended session.



The staff worked very hard to remove a few pews at the back of the Sanctuary and create a kid-friendly space where families can sit in their family "pods". There will be activities and a snack available. Children age 3 and above are asked to wear masks and maintain social distance from those not in their family. Purple dots at the front of the Sanctuary help direct this during Chiming and Children's Sermon.



On August 15 during worship, students and teachers were recognized and blessed before the new school year. The Church has many former youth and members who are teachers making this Sunday a very special time to honor their profession. Cheryl reminded us that, for many, their love of teaching was fostered by their helping with Vacation Bible School and teaching on mission trips as youth. Please continue to pray for teachers and students as they continue to handle the challenges of Pandemic learning.



Each teacher was given a \$100 gift card from the Church, a huge bag of school supplies that the **Mission Service Group** helped collect from the church members. The gift card was for the teacher to use to buy needed items for their classrooms. Just for fun the teacher received a \$15 Sonic card.

Highlights from administrative service group summer projects.

- There have been many repairs to our facility over the summer months: Atrium lights and upstairs lighting partially addressed. Plumbing—leak in basement repaired, decision yet to be made about fixing or replacing water coolers.
- The wall-attached shelf and desk in the Assistant's office collapsed. Fortunately, no one was sitting at the desk at the time and the computer was inside a file drawer and not damaged. The wall has been repaired, and office repainted.
- Entrance Door Mats were ordered for each entrance (thank you Mary Ellen Sullivan, Kelley DeCleene, Becky Dillard, and David McGrath for working on this project). They are made of 100% recycled PET fibers with 20% recycled tire-rubber backing. Paragon Prep will be paying half of cost.
- A large new locking postal box has been installed near the Teague Chapel, providing security for the church and Paragon Prep and convenience for postal workers. This location will allow Paragon Prep to close the parking lot during school hours from the corner at Meals on Wheels around to the Art Hive (back building).
- The bus has an electrical problem that slowly drains the battery. The mechanic suggested it be taken to an RV repair shop because of the complicated wiring.
- A new fire safe box was purchased to replace use of safety deposit boxes. Persons who are no longer at the church had signatory access, which caused major problems. Fortunately, Nathan Thane had access. Thank you, Gary Farmer, Nancy Osgood, and Nathan Thane, for working on this.
- Paragon Prep is back in session and is actually using more square footage than before due to Covid precautions. Paragon is a great partner and we are glad to have them back this year.
- Service Wizard has made multiple trips to the Church over these hot months. The largest repair was fixing one of the Sanctuary's Condenser units. These units will eventually need to be replaced as parts are no longer available. Thermostats are slowly being replaced as they need repairs.
- The renewal of Cabo Bob's lease (parsonage) is currently being negotiated.

- We donated school supplies for the Church at Highland Park teachers




